TIVING THE HIGHEST DETREE OF HONOR

THU > Read Romans 13:1

Sometimes honoring those in charge is easy—like when they run things the way we would or they don't tell us what to do. But then one day, they tell us we have to do something we don't want to do and suddenly we think we have a free pass to disobey. But that's not what the Bible says, is it? Complete obedience means even when we don't want to, we honor the authority God has put over us.

Find a couple of friends and play "Simon Says"* but say your name or whoever is leading. While you play, think about how the only way to win the game is by truly honoring "Simon" with your obedience—both by doing the action, and by playing by the rules of the game (waiting for Simon to say, "Simon says.")

ASK God to help you honor those in charge, even when you don't feel like it.

*How to play Simon Says: One person plays Simon and tells the other players what to do (jump in the air, clap your hands, etc.) The other players must obey Simon, but ONLY when Simon gives the instructions beginning with, "Simon says..." If the players either don't obey when Simon says, "Simon says...", or if they do the action when Simon HASN'T said, "Simon says," then they're out. Last one standing wins!

Read 1 Peter 2:17

What do you think "honoring the king" means? We don't have a king here in the United States, do we? But we do have a president—and your state has a governor, and your city has a mayor. All of those people could be considered modern-day kings. Since the Bible says we are to honor them, what do you think that means?

Do we only honor those who we agree with? What about politicians who have different beliefs from you? Or what about your teacher who gives you too much homework? Do

But the truth is, those who are older than you have experienced more life and probably do have a lot of wisdom they can share with you. KNOW that asking questions and listening to the answer is a great way to show honor!
